Later this year she will direct COCK, by Mike Bartlett, at Chichester Festival Theatre.

2017 also saw Kate direct THE ICE ROAD, an immersive, site-specific play set in disused Edwardian swimming baths in Bristol. It was produced by Raucous

Theatre and written by Sharon Clark. She also revived her hit production of KIKI'S DELIVERY SERVICE at the Southwark Playhouse, and served as Associate Director on the remount of Simon Stones' YERMA at the Young Vic.

Prior to that she directed the National Youth Theatre production of ROMEO & JULIET at the Ambassadors Theatre in London's West End. In 2015 Kate directed TOMCAT, James Rushbrooke's Papatango-winning play, at the Southwark Playhouse:

Also in 2015 Kate directed Racheal Ofori in her one woman show PORTRAIT at the Edinburgh Fringe, on its subsequent UK Tour, and on its appearance at the Bush RADAR Festival.

Kate was the associate director on Kwame Kwei-Armah's production of ONE LOVE: THE BOB MARLEY MUSICAL at the Birmingham Rep. She was the associate director on Sam Mendes' production of CHARLIE AND THE CHOCOLATE FACTORY: THE NEW MUSICAL at the Theatre Royal Drury Lane.

Kate won the 2014 JMK Directors Award, and her winning production of Caryl Churchill's FAR AWAY ran at the Young Vic until November 29th of that year. The Times said of her production that 'In the mark of a great directorial talent, Hewitt will make even the doubters fall in love with Caryl Churchill'. She also recently worked with the National Youth Theatre on their Epic Stages project, in August 2015.

Kate trained as a performer with the NYT, and performed in Rapunzel (Kneehigh Theatre Company, UK tour and Broadway debut). She has two years' Lecoq physical theatre training from LISPA, a BA (Hons) in drama and theatre arts from Goldsmiths University London and received a Jerwood Assistant Director Award (2012).
